




#### The Dora D. Robinson Speaker Series: Supporting our Superwomen

Closing the spring semester was a reception and fundraiser held the evening before the annual Commencement celebrations featuring Mary Louise McDonald, President of the Sinn Féin Irish political party and 2024 Commencement speaker, recognized for her contributions to housing, healthcare, and climate change in Ireland. Attendees contributed to global initiatives aimed at expanding study abroad programs, with proceeds enhancing international experiences for Westfield State students and underscoring the University's commitment to diverse educational opportunities.

In McDonald's Commencement address she praised graduates for their perseverance and encouraged them to implement change in their communities and worldwide. "You made it," she said. "You all climbed the mountain in your own way and today, you proudly plant your own flag on the summit of success. All of the sacrifices, hours in the library, the late-night assignment deadlines, the exams... all of the moments where you doubted your path but still found the determination to believe in yourself and carry on, it has all led you here to this incredible point of success. It was all worth it. Never underestimate your achievements because this life will have lots of twists and turns. But nobody will ever take this away from you because you've earned it."

President Linda Thompson added, "President McDonald's practices of supporting and encouraging social justice, democracy, equity, fairness, and inclusion are not unlike the principles of Horace Mann, the founder of our institution. President McDonald has demonstrated her belief in the quality and importance of higher education and her devotion to lifelong learning and volunteer service"

#### Debuting New Traditions

Westfield State supporters got a fun new tradition and some competition with the inaugural Homecoming online auction organized by the Westfield State University Foundation Fundraising Committee.

Over 50 items worth over \$10,000 were donated from local businesses, alumni, and supporters with special

donations coming from faculty and staff who offered up unique opportunities s uch as a special food and wine pairing in the Dining Commons and a private dinner with President Thompson. Attendees of the Homecoming Scholarship Dinner got a special preview of items while online bidding moved swiftly, sparking friendly competition amongst interested participants. However, students were the real winners of the event thanks to the money raised for scholarships and other critical support.

#### Shine a Light on Scholarship

The annual Scholarship Dinner highlighted four scholarships: the Dan Doyle Memorial Scholarship, the Jerry Gavel Memorial Scholarship, the Class of 1969 Scholarship, and the Dr. Terrell M. Hill "Leader for Change" Scholarship. Scholarships like these provide critical support for deserving students and provide alumni and friends with an opportunity to give back to a place they love.

The Dan Doyle Memorial Scholarship honors Daniel Doyle '81 who passed in 1982. As Doyle was a member of both the cross country and track teams at Westfield State, student-athletes have raised over \$200,000 in the 30 years this scholarship's been awarded.

The Jerry Gavel Memorial Scholarship commemorates Coach Jerry Gavel, who was a coach, teacher, and mentor at the University. Similarly, over \$200,000 in funds has been raised through fundraising over the span of 30 years.

Created by fellow classmates, the **Class of 1969 Scholarship** memorializes and honors peers and friends who are both living and deceased, while simultaneously inspiring other classes to leave their own legacies.

The Dr. Terrell M. Hill "Leader for Change" Scholarship was established by Dr. Hill to help underrepresented minority and first-generation students receive quality education.

The Scholarship Dinner also honored Roland Damon '56, '59 who is supporting the University in honor of his late wife, Ruth Merritt Damon, and whose generosity and enthusiasm also inspired his children to give, making philanthropy a family affair.

#### Honoring Owl Nation

The biannual Athletic Hall of Fame welcomed new inductees and celebrated those whose support of the Owls keeps the Westfield State programs running.

"Events like Homecoming are often a reason to call home alumni athletes, coaches, and supporters to celebrate what it means to be an Owl." President Thompson said in her opening remarks. "Our athletes are diplomats and ambassadors for our University, representing our campus during travels across the region, and I am proud our alumni continue to do the same as they reflect so positively on our University."

Tom Stewart '88, was inducted for his contributions to cross country and track and field. He's now the Director of Athletics at Holyoke Community College, where he's served since 1996.

Kerry Arouca '10 was also inducted for cross country and track. Once a former middle school teacher, she now runs day care activities for several local physicians in the Brockton area.

Andrea Cohen '09 was inducted for women's basketball category and serves as a stay-at-home mother for her four children. Cohen remains involved in the basketball communities, as she coaches her daughter's youth basketball team.

Josh Mathieu '10 was inducted for men's football and is one of just 11 All-Americans in the history of the Owls program. He currently is a police detective in Lunenburg, Massachusetts.

The final inductee was Dave Jaehnig '09, for men's basketball. As a middle school math teacher in Waltham, he continues to influence the next generation of students and future athletes.





# BUILDING A Brighter Future ONE OWL AT A TIME

# PARENZO HALL GRAND OPENING



October 2023 saw the grand re-opening of Parenzo Hall, one of the oldest academic buildings on the Westfield State campus, following a \$40 million renovation. Homecoming Co-Chairs Doug Meehan '88 and Rae Cofsky '17 hosted campus leaders and dignitaries for the official ribbon cutting and the first event back in Dever Auditorium. The event was especially meaningful for the Co-Chairs as they both got their start in the professional world of communications and entertainment on the same stage as student performers.

Dr. Robert Martin, Board of Trustees Chair; Michael McCabe '84, '94, Westfield mayor; Adam Baacke, Commissioner from the Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance; President Linda Thompson; and Nicholas Smith '24, President of the Student Government Association, all spoke about their hopes for Parenzo Hall, as it continues to be a pivotal part of campus infrastructure.

"It was collaboration, hard work, innovative ideas, and risk-taking that got us to this point." President Thompson said during her address. "The groups and individuals that made this renovation happen cross many disciplines. They all were tenacious. We can all agree this is a beautiful space. It is an inspirational space. It's a space to think and dream and learn. Students, faculty, and staff, enjoy this building. Make it your home. Take risks. Pursue your big ideas. Seek out help from others. While this building has a long history for us, this renovation is for our future. It's for your future. This is a proud day for Westfield State University."

Nicholas Smith echoed this sentiment. "Westfield State University is almost 185 years old and since our founding, the institution has always been an example of modernity and innovation. I believe we see evidence of these ideals in this space. I would encourage my fellow students to spend time here. Explore the offices and study spaces. Get to know the people who will be working in this building. This building, after all, was designed with students in mind. This is a space where we can be creative and innovative with our education. #### RIDE Center Prepares Today's Students for Tomorrow's Innovation


A key feature of Parenzo Hall is the Research, Innovation, Design & Entrepreneurial (RIDE) Center. Led by Dr. Lamis Jarvinen, the RIDE Center is not just a fabrication lab—it's a place for developing innovative ideas and entrepreneurial practices in Western Massachusetts and beyond. The RIDE Center is dedicated to getting students involved by partnering with external stakeholders and community leaders to address complex problems with fabrication and design tools that encourage creativity and innovation, engaging and preparing students to be thought leaders for jobs of the future.

Supported in large part with grants and donations, the RIDE Center promises to open new worlds for students, enhance instruction by Westfield State faculty, and make connections for creative entrepreneurs who are shaping our future. The Center immediately became a hub of activity with an entrepreneurial speaker series, workshops and training opportunities for faculty, staff, and students, and public events such as the Nonprofit Innovators Forum hosted with the Masters of Public Administration, Policy, and Civic Engagement Program. The RIDE Center also plays a key role in attracting future students to Westfield State by hosting groups such as the Junior Discover program which brought high school students from Springfield and Holyoke to engage with the RIDE Center to solve problems through innovation and creative thinking.

## Honoring "DOC ROM'S" Legacy

Professor Patrick Romano, longtime faculty member of the Department of Chemistry at Westfield State University, passed away in March 2023 after a brief battle with lung cancer. In honor of his life, legacy, and 50 years of service to the Owl community, the Department of Chemical and Physical Sciences undertook a fundraising campaign with a \$50,000 goal to support the Patrick "Doc Rom" Romano Memorial Award in Chemistry, an annual recognition for one deserving student who follows in Professor Romano's image. In addition, the fundraising efforts led to the naming of the Patrick Romano Memorial Laboratory in the Nettie Stevens Science and Innovation Center, a building Dr. Romano saw rise on the Westfield State campus.

Professor Romano joined the faculty at Westfield State University after earning his Ph.D. at Worcester Polytechnic Institute. He became a steadfast fixture in the department over an astounding 50-year career, including multiple stints as Department Chair. Amazingly, Professor Romano was involved in hiring every faculty member working in the department at the time of his retirement in 2021. His love for teaching was surpassed only by his dedication to mentorship. Professor Romano connected with countless students over his career, and sincerely enjoyed supporting them in their academic pursuits beyond college.

### OWLS Across MASSACHUSETTS

What started as a simple question—"How many Westfield State alumni live on Cape Cod?"—quickly blossomed into a powerful example of alumni initiative and community spirit.

Two members of the Westfield State Alumni Association Executive Council from the Class of 1971, Dr. Perry Davis and Arlene Tierney, both Cape Cod residents, were curious about their fellow Owls in the region. After some digging, it was discovered that over 1,200 alumni live on Cape Cod and the Islands—a vibrant community just waiting to connect.

Inspired by this discovery, Perry, Arlene, and their spouses, who are also proud Westfield State alumni, rolled up their sleeves to form the Westfield State Alumni Cape Cod Club. Their goal was simple yet powerful: to create meaningful connections and rekindle the shared spirit of their alma mater.

To kick off the effort, Arlene and Doug Tierney hosted a warm, potluck-style gathering at their home during August, 2023. The event drew over 40 enthusiastic alumni and friends, all sharing stories, laughter, and a common bond that time hadn't faded. Especially since attendees ranged from the classes of 1964 all the way to 2012.
