III. PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Nicholas Smith

A. Executive Director of the Research Innovation, Design, and Entrepreneurial Center (RIDE): **Dr. Lamis Jarvinen**

A. Strategic Planning Committee: Daniel Currier

The Strategic Planning Committee met at noon yesterday to refine the three institutional priorities we agreed to during our three-day retreat with SME Strategy Consulting. Our committee was divided into three smaller groups, and we each worked to refine the wording and meaning of each of these priorities.

This week, we will be dividing into three subcommittees – each focusing on one of the three institutional priorities identified. We will be meeting as subcommittees and the full committee on alternate weeks through May. We look forward to developing Westfield State University's next five-year strategic plan and move our institution forward.

As I mentioned previously, my role is to help inform not only this body, but the student body at-large regarding the strategic plan. I have consulted with the Executive Council regarding a potential communications strategy, and I appreciate their feedback. One of the ideas shared, for example, was a postcard mailing to all first-years, sophomores, and juniors, which would more likely be read and considered important by students as opposed to yet another email communication. Please let me know if you have any other ideas on how to best inform students about the strategic plan and its importance in relation to their experience at Westfield State University.

V. <u>VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT-STUDENT LIFE</u>: A. Food Services Committee: *Jacob Constant*

Hello all, I am Jacob Constant and I am back for a second report but this time for the Food Committee.

The Food Committee met last Friday, February 23rd, and we discussed the progress on the counter, new food ideas, and moving the committee meetings to bi-weekly being on the 2nd and 4th Friday of the month. Giving the committee more topics to talk about in the meetings, however it was mentioned that anyone can still go up to Sara, Bill, or anyone in dining if they have any issues that they want heard at the time of the issue.

The update on the drink counter. The wall that was holding up the old counter will start to be rebuilt in the next two weeks. Then tile will be drilled out and fixed and will likely be a new color as the current color has been discontinued by the manufacturer. The backsplash will be a white tile that will be much easier to clean. They are also adding a dedicated water line to each machine they plan to add to help with issues if and when they come up. The counter itself is moving along

in good shape from what we have been told and is expected to be installed in 8-10 weeks right around commencement.

Then finally we talked about a food showing that happened last week and I was fortunate enough to be asked to join in because I was in the DC. The food was greek products. We tried 2 types of Swiss cheese, Traditional pies which were Traditional Spinach and cheese pie, Mediterranean with tomato and a Vegan spinach and cheese substitute pie which in my opinion was the best out of the three. We also tried some pastries which they referred to as sticks and there were a few different kinds, one being a savory cheese one and my favorite an Apple pie with sugar. They also brought some Greek beans which will be added to the rotation in the salad bar.
